In the Garden...with Claire at Combe Dingle Nursery

This time of year, I get the feeling of being reunited with an old friend. The garden is always there dealing with whatever life throws at it. Be it the weather, pests or an unsightly utility trench left gaping. Time spent in winter and spring and a little catch up here and there has the garden in good stead. Now the pace of the nursery slows a little. This allows me more time in my own garden, and I can't wait.

The most important job this month was fence rebuilding. I pride myself on trying to turn my hand to any job and soon I was digging post holes and measuring rails. The recommendation to use Hit and Miss was not referring to my hammer skills, but a fence that lets the wind pass through and still gives privacy. I look forward to attaching wires to the fence for climbers and a making new flowers bed alongside it.

I have planted several new climbers recently. Planting and wire fixing should be done at the same time. Tying the plant to the front of the wires with twine. A new climber will immediately try to climb. If there is nothing there then it will only get itself into a tangle. All roses, including climbers have been fabulous this year with no strong wind or rain to damage them. Keep dead heading by cutting back cleanly above a healthy bud.

I don't feel under any pressure to get jobs done in the garden. It will get done when I get there. A little neglect can look beautiful. The vegetable garden is dotted with red of self-seeded poppies and blue of borage. There is plenty to harvest and areas are cleared to plant new.

Broad beans and garlic are cropped and cleared. Peas, chard, kale and so much more are picked. I don't really go in for rows and neatness these days, but plant in blocks when there is a space. The Nursery has a ready supply of plants to fill the gaps. This week I have been putting in plants of French beans, beetroot etc. and those for winter and spring cropping- Purple sprouting broccoli, sprouts, leeks etc.

I have an experimental area, with the no dig method of covering a patch of stinging nettles and a grass path with cardboard and then a layer of compost. It did an amazing job of stopping the nettles and grass, but the compost dried out quickly. Maybe a thicker layer would have been better or laying it earlier in the year. I expect this area to be far more productive next year.

Remember to enjoy your bit of earth. Whether it is repairing, planting, deadheading, harvesting or sitting back enjoying the scents and sound of nature around you.

Lots of success stories to report this time!

Our first attempt at live streaming using the new projector and Wi-Fi worked perfectly, and we had a great evening watching the **Jubilee concert** in the hall (decorated for the event, of course – thank you Jackie Cobbledick and team).

The committee worked really hard on the **Open Gardens**, organising, publicising, signing, devising and selling programmes, providing teas and Pimm's and a hanging basket for the raffle, and directing visitors, while Heather ran the village café. The garden owners had clearly made a massive effort to ensure that their gardens were at their best (well, surely they can't look that brilliant ALL the time, can they?!). We were rewarded with a lovely sunny day, not too hot and not too cold, and with lots of visitors from near and far, to the extent that we twice had to print more programmes as we kept running out! Everyone thoroughly enjoyed the day and we raised over £850 for the hall, an unprecedented amount. Too many people were involved to list individually, but thank you all, committee and garden owners, for giving us such a wonderful day.

The **film nights** continue to do well, with "Belfast" and "The Queens' Corgi" (two films that couldn't have been more different!) proving to be a particularly popular double billing, and "Death on the Nile" attracting a good audience too. The next film will be "**House of Gucci**" on Friday 5th August (doors open at 6.30 for 7.00 showing), followed by "**Operation Mincemeat**" on 2nd September, a brilliant gripping film based on the true story of deception played on the Nazis in WW2 to misdirect them regarding the D Day landings. email **csnvillagehall@hotmail.com** if you would like to be added to the mailing list alerting you to the forthcoming films.

Now that the Save the Dragon campaign has finished and is no longer running its monthly 50/50 draw, the Village Hall committee has decided to start up the **Combe St Nicholas Village Hall 100 Club**, which was planned some time ago but put on ice so as not to compete with Save the Dragon. It will be open to all residents of our village and the surrounding area and their families and friends. As it is a private lottery, you have to be invited to join and you must be 16 or over. You pay £12 for a year's membership, and you will be allocated a number (or more numbers at £12 each if you want). Each month there will be a draw for 50% of the monthly income. This amount will be divided between 3 lucky winners, chosen and announced at the monthly Sunday Roast Café in the hall. The more people who become members, the greater the prize money! We plan to start this in September, so look out for publicity in due course, which will include details of how to join.

Councillors View

Firstly, thanks to all who supported me in the recent Unitary Elections and it's interesting that myself and Jenny Kenton have been elected as we have been doing the District side of the job together for a number of years.

Now all the electioneering is out of the way it's now time to get back to try to deal with the many and varied Council matters affecting us all.

Jenny and I consult and meet regularly and I can't think of a time we have not agreed on the various decisions we have had to make over the years in relation to planning etc. There are still difficulties in relation to planning with new measures being in place in relation to excess phosphate in our river system which has slowed many applications.

However, there are still a number of applications being submitted and if you have objections to or indeed support a particular application it is very helpful to your Councillors if you submitted these to South Somerset Council and also make sure the Parish Council know your views.

I'm sure we have all been frustrated by the ongoing road works particularly around Crimchard. Unfortunately, these will be moving towards us mid July with a closure between Langham and Cuttiford's door. Hopefully by the time 'Cloverleaf' reaches you they may be nearly finished!

I have found the County Council website very simple to report potholes or other faults but should you have difficulties please contact me and I will report them.

I recently received a request from Highways England seeking suggestions in relation to major routes in my 'patch'. I intend to reply to suggest a fresh assessment be made in relation to that long running saga of the Eagle Tavern junction. Not holding my breath but we shall see!

It's going to be interesting wearing two hats until next May when Districts and County Councils merge into one and I'm sure there will be some difficulties on the way but hopefully it will not interfere with the various Council services too much. At least you'll only have to contact myself or Jenny with all Council queries!

Sunday School Wood

From time to time, I mention Brian's Patch. Now, you can easily identify where I mean. Stella has had a new sign made, and you will easily see where it has been placed. There is currently a wide array of wild flowers, in flower, growing in this area, with hopefully many more still to come. At the moment, the predominant colour is yellow, but hopefully, red and blue will also increase.

The foxgloves we planted some long time ago have flowered well, and produced many seeds. These should self sow ready to flower next year (always hopeful). The adjacent bed to this was, at one time, becoming overgrown and we started to clear it for a new start next year, but nature took over and the area became covered in speedwell and scarlet pimpernel, and more recently poppies and corn marigold have appeared. We last sowed seeds containing these several years ago, confirming that wild flower seeds can remain dormant for some time.

The first, larger, bed on the right of the main path has become very overgrown, and is becoming invaded by rose bay willowherb. Lots of cranesbill have also grown. As nice as these both are, we have had to be brutal and strim them back to try and retain some sort of control over the area.

One maintenance issue has arisen, in that the end fence post adjacent to the Rectory Gardens road is rotting and probably needs replacing. This is a job too far for the Tuesday morning team and needs liaison with the PCC.

Combe St. Nicholas Parish Council

2 new Councillors were co-opted at the May meeting, and we welcome Louise Simmonds and Cressida Govier.

2 Planning applications were discussed last month – both in Combe Wood Lane. A site meeting was held with the Agent regarding the amended plans re heights and designs. The Parish Council objected to these amended plans as they stand now, but understand further amended plans will be forthcoming. The application for 9 new buildings on the adjacent field were strongly objected to.

The Lawns Play Area: Some work is still required around the play equipment to restore the wooden surrounds to the safer surfacing on the older equipment, and to trim the lower overhang on the large beech tree. Hopefully this will be carried out shortly. If a child is `caught short` please make sure they use the facilities in school before they come out, or take them home or to a friends house, but do not use area behind the hedges – it is most unpleasant for other children to walk in.

Queen's 70th Jubilee: All the events went off successfully – many thanks to everyone involved and to Mick for regularly watering the new tree on the Lawns.

Speed Indicator Devices: It was resolved to purchase 2 of these devices in an attempt to get drivers to slow down through our Parish. Permission from Highways and Police is now being sought for positions. A trained person is required to change/move these devices – if you are interested, training will be provided, or if you have a highways licence, please get in touch.

Flood Warden Training: Following the very heavy rains last June work is still progressing to try and stop the flooding happening again. Several residents in the Parish have attended flood Warden Training sessions organised by `Somerset Prepared` and we hope to have a session organised in our village hall for residents to attend. Other investigations/dialogues are also progressing to create a Plan to mitigate future flooding, including keeping ditches clear.

Pudleigh public footpath: Repairs to the bridge along the footpath between Pudleigh and Wadeford have now been completed, together with strengthening the bank where the amount of water last June caused so much damage. Further works are planned.

The next Parish Council meetings are due on Monday 22nd August and Monday 27th September in the Village Hall at 7.30pm.



Combe Community Group



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A Moment in Time with John Phillips

"Infamy! Infamy! I am entirely of the mind that they have it in for me."

Whilst these may not have been his exact words, they undoubtedly reflected the feelings of Rev. Dr Gamalial Chase in 1646.

The Rector of Wambrook and Yarcombe was in a rare old pickle. He was one of a very small number who suffered at the hands of both Parliament and Royalists. He was a scholarly graduate of Queen's College, Oxford, which had a mild leaning towards the more 'Catholic' practice and theology of the Church of England. In 1641 he had purchased £150 worth of land from a royalist, probably the Lord of the Manor of Whitestaunton, Sir Robert Brett. For this he was fined £118 by the parliamentary authorities when the tides of war gave them control of the area.

When the Royalist Cornish Army reversed this for a time, he was imprisoned by Sir Robert Brett of Whitestaunton for paying this £118 to the parliamentarians. He somehow managed to escape, but in 1645 he is ejected with his wife and seven children from Wambrook and Yarcombe. His books, manuscripts, corn and livestock seized by Parliamentary troops from the Lyme Garrison. A year later he was fined £112 for 'delinquency' and spent time in prison at Lyme and Portsmouth.

He was replaced by the Rev. Henry Blackaller whose son was appointed Rector in 1648. As the wheel of fate turned his son was turned out of the rectorship after the restoration of Charles II in 1660 and the Rev. Dr Chase was reinstated and later his grandson became the Rector of Wambrook.

At least he had survived the turbulence of the times unlike the unfortunate Rev. Thomas Greenfield who was removed from the vicarage at Combe in 1650 and according to the Rev. Aldridge in his history of Combe (1927) died in a prison hulk on the Thames.

The manor was taken from the Dean and Chapter of Wells and sold by the Parliamentary commissioners to Nathaniel Smyth of Wiltshire and Arthur Mallock of London (gentleman). Henry Blackallar having left the Rectorship at Wambrook was then appointed Vicar of Combe in his stead. He in turn resigned in 1662, "although he had sixteen children and nothing to keep them on" as he could not agree to the Act of Uniformity.

Men and women of principle on both sides of this great division in England suffered and even those somewhat in the middle like the Rev. Chase!







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Vicar's Letter

Jesus said, 'Let the little children come to me, and do not stop them; for it is to such as these that the kingdom of heaven belongs.' (Matthew 19: 14). This is part of the reading that I frequently use at baptisms, and I read it yesterday as part of a service of Thanksgiving for a New Baby.

It can be a puzzling reading, and I am sure that the disciples and others listening to Jesus were perplexed as to what he might mean. After all, many of those following Jesus were expecting him to be the Messiah who would save the Jewish nation from the yoke of Roman rule. How, could little children possibly be part of this? When I read this at baptisms I do always go on and explain what I think Jesus might have meant, and in doing so I try and make it helpful to people who may never have set foot in a church before and are not familiar with the story of Jesus.

Small children are in some ways anarchists – they will do whatever they want and do not understand anyone else's needs. Putting this in a more positive way, small children are completely themselves. They do not have any 'edge' to them, no hidden agendas nor do they wear any masks. Children cannot help but be themselves. I think that Jesus saw this in children.

As we grow up, we begin to take on other 'personas', we worry more about what others think about us and tend to show different sides of ourselves to different types or groups of people. In other words we become adults, and we are complex. Jesus saw all of these complexities in others and was compassionate towards them, looking beyond all the layers we build up and seeing into people's hearts.

However, perhaps in saying that the kingdom of heaven belongs to small children, he was longing for the complex adults surrounding him to look into their own hearts and find their true selves, the selves that God created and has his deepest connection with.

Small children do not generally struggle with the concept of God or of Jesus. They are open to the spiritual, the mysterious and the wonderful. As adults, we can become very wary and cynical, but God calls us to be as small children and not close our minds and hearts. God speaks to us at the very deepest level of our being and Jesus is the example of how he does this and his church, at its very best, reflects this in the way that it welcomes everyone as they are, as themselves.

If we are truly to become part of the Kingdom of Heaven, then let us embrace this idea and allow small children to teach us about being our true selves, seeing beyond the material, and responding to all that life has to offer with wonder, curiosity and open hearts.

In the first week of August, we will be holding our Chard Churches Together Holiday Club, and sixty children will be joining us to have fun, play games, do crafts, sing and, most importantly, hear about Jesus and his love for them. I think Jesus will be very present, loving and accepting the children for who they are and speaking to their sense of wonder and fun. Let us hope that we will be up to the challenge of doing the same.
