In the Garden...with Claire Stenhouse at Combe Dingle Nursery

With the arrival of September, the change of season could be felt. As if overnight the heatwaves of this summer were over. One morning the world just felt different, smelt, and sounded different. The summer had been glorious but there were decisions about watering to make. In the nursery plants were grouped close together to reduce water use and some were moved out of the glare of the sun. Established plants and lawns usually recover. If not then it could be the wrong plant in the wrong place and that a more drought tolerant plant should be chosen. Lawns that looked brown and singed now need mowing again.

With the warm, wet September the garden has been given a new lease of life. Now is a great time for planting. Herbaceous perennials can be lifted and divided while the soil is still warm. The splitting keeps the plant renewed and healthy. They will then have the winter to settle in and have a head start for the year ahead.

The full range of bulbs will now be in the shops. Get in early to get the best selection and to pick out the best quality. Bulbs are so easy and give such joy. Some are great for naturalising in grass and multiply every year. Some are unlikely to come back the next year but put on such a show that they are worth redoing every autumn. Some provide crucial nectar for insects in the early spring sunshine. At Combe Dingle we are happy to advise, just ask.

I was pleased to get all the potatoes harvested and stored before the rain started. Good crops of garlic, onions and shallots have been stored. The vegetable garden may have been more productive if I watered more, but I don't and our first Combe Dingle cheen according into the garden didn't help m



Dingle sheep escaping into the garden didn't help matters.

Now is time to plant garlic, autumn onion and shallot sets and broad beans. Spring cabbage plug plants will be here by the last week of September. Planted any earlier and you run the risk of them bolting. The climbing borlotti beans on the no dig are doing well. I look forward to harvesting them at the end of the season. Still not enough for a year's supply but we all need something to aspire to. In gardening there will always be 'that was good, but next year I will do better.' It's what keeps us interested.

The very sad news of the death of Queen Elizabeth II has affected many residents, and some events may have been cancelled. A minutes silence was held at the start of the September Parish Council meeting.

The Lawns, Play Area. After requesting a visit from the playgrounds inspector, adjustments have now been made to the Skyrail and it now runs slightly slower.

Flood Warden Training/Community Contingency Plan – Work is still progressing to try and alleviate problems especially concerning the water courses and ditches, as well as schemes to enable better drainage possibly through planting more trees.

A Community Contingency Plan is also being drawn up to consider any type of circumstance/emergency event that could impact the Parish community .

Parish Emergency Plan – Public Meeting

The last issue reported that the Parish Council was working on developing a general emergency plan for our community. On **Monday 7th November**, at 7.30 pm, there will be an open public meeting in the Village Hall about the plan. We will set out the benefits of planning ahead and how the community would cope in an emergency and invite people to set out their concerns and provide assistance where appropriate.

This will be an opportunity to engage with the Parish Council in the development of the plan. Refreshments will be available.

Sunday School Wood

Activity lately has been limited by weather, from too hot to too wet. Brian's patch has become overgrown with unwanted vegetation, so we have completely strimmed it ready for rotavating. Optimistically, we have sourced wild flower seeds for next year. One of the big problems is watering if we have dry spells - it is too far to carry much, so we have to trust to luck.

We have tried planting more foxgloves, these being biennial, but following the hot dry spell, the ground was more like concrete. We are just hoping that the more recent wet weather will have helped.

Alan has repaired a couple of nest boxes. One of these, for blue tits, has a brass plate for the entry hole, and a woodpecker had sat there and made a new way in! This has now been blocked off. He is also in the process of modifying the owl box. So far, it has not been used by owls, but something overwinters there.

The first flower bed on the right, after entry from the churchyard, became overgrown with grass earlier this year, so that area was strimmed and mown. and now shows lots of Tansy and Cranesbill. so flowers still to come. We have also obtained some yellow rattle seed to sow there in late autumn. The idea is that, being semi parasitic, and using grass roots for its own growth, it will inhibit new grass growth. (That is the theory!)



Underway Meade

This summer has presented us with something of a challenge in terms of controlling the vegetation in the Meade, and special thanks are due to Bill, Stuart, Chris, Gill and the Combe Critters team for keeping on top of it. Following a ragwort removal onslaught by Lynn, Gill and Pat, our seven woolly lawnmowers are now back on the mound, and although there's plenty of grass for them to eat, they come rushing down for their breakfast every morning, and baa loudly to make their views known if we're late feeding them! Thanks to Emma and Owen for helping with this task.

The weather was kind to us for our moth trapping event in July, and Rob Grimmond did a great job identifying the wide range of moths that we captured as well as giving us some fascinating information about moths in general. The moorhens on the pond have raised two broods this year, and one of the teenagers from the first brood has been very good at helping mum with feeding and even apparently playing with the younger ones. Bill has filled in the old well



near the pond after we checked that this would cause no problems, and he has also put up a rustic handrail alongside the wheelchair detour alongside the mound.

We have some concerns about the condition of the large ash tree, which may be affected by ash dieback, so we have commissioned a professional survey, and are now awaiting the report.

There is always more work to be done maintaining the Meade, and we will be pleased to welcome back the Wessex Water Volunteers and the Neroche Volunteers this autumn. Jobs which we aim to tackle ourselves include trimming the trees overhanging the road and clearing some more of the reeds and sludge from the pond. We will be looking for help with the pond clearance session, so watch out for posters advertising this in due course!

Finally, it's time we thanked all our wonderful Friends of the Meade, without whose financial support we couldn't continue. Did you know that there's a Home Library Service that's available to anyone who is unable to visit their local library. This includes people who may be housebound, living in long term care, carers, or people who are vulnerable due to long term conditions or disabilities and it's open to people of all ages.

When you contact us, we will arrange for a volunteer to visit you. You can discuss what you like to read and the best times to visit you, usually on fortnightly or monthly basis. The volunteer will then go to the library to choose your books and deliver them to you.

Our volunteers have been DBS (Disclosure and Barring Service) checked and have given references. If you have a neighbour or a friend who is willing to visit the library for you, they can register as a 'good neighbour'. They will then be able to choose and collect books and other items on your behalf.



A Moment in Time with John Phillips

In the early 1700s the Rev Stukeley, the famous antiquarian, was not impressed with the state of the roads in this area. He described the main Salisbury to Exeter highway as it passed through Lower Wambrook and on to Stockland as "a very bad road of stones and sand over brooks, springheads and barren downs". Indeed, so bad was this road that most travellers turned off at Cricket St. Thomas and headed south to Axminster (using the old roman road, the Fosseway) and then to Honiton or vice-versa.

From Saxon times until the 1550's landowners were responsible for the upkeep of highways and byways passing through or by their estates. The growth of the population, commerce and manufacturing from 1500 put increasing pressure on an already creaking road network. The abolition of the monasteries in 1530's and the sale of their enormous land holdings further exacerbated matters as they were relatively conscientious in their road maintenance and bridge repair duties.

In an attempt to remedy the dreadful state of the roads a number of Highways Acts were passed in the reigns of Queen Mary I and Queen Elizabeth I. The parish was made responsible for the maintenance of the Queen's Highways. Annually the parishes of Combe, Wambrook and Whitestaunton each elected 2 waywardens to plan, coordinate and supervise the repair of the highways passing through them. These repairs were to be carried out 6 days before the Feast of John the Baptist, 24th June. It was to be carried out by all the farmers and cottagers of the parish. Those with at least a plough, i.e. the larger farmers had to supply a cart, 2 able men and draught animals, oxen or horses 'according to the custom of the area'. Everyone else had to turn up with mattocks and shovels.

The main highway Combe was responsible for ran from Wadeford up Stoopers Hill to the Eagle Tavern, Wambrook the aforementioned highways to Honiton, and Whitestaunton for the part of the present A30 within its bounds. At the time this stretch of A30 route was known as the Whitestaunton road and was not part of the main east-west route it has now become.

The waywardens had a thankless task and the unpaid workforce were soon given the label of the King's loiterers. It was said at the time that a paid day labourer would 'do more work in one day than six or seven of the unpaid'. Writers at the time stated that during the 6 days 'scarcely 2 good days work were well performed' and that the King's Highwaymen spent 'most of their time in standing still and prating (chatting)' or asking for largesse from passing travellers. Later changing the choice of waywardens from elected to appointment by the Justices made little difference. Roads stayed in a deplorable state until the introduction of the Turn Pike Trusts, of which more next time - if you can manage the anticipation!

Although it never seemed to rain in July until the month was almost over, occasional and light overnight showers gave a total of 8mm, the second lowest sum recorded for a July since records began here in 1987- only beaten by 7mm measured in 1989.

August's total of 35mm was also on the low side when compared to the 10 year averages, with most of the rain falling in the second half of the month.

Vicar's Letter

I am aware that by the time you read this we will have moved out of our period of mourning for our Queen Elizabeth and bade her farewell to eternal rest. However, we cannot do so without marking the life of a quite remarkable woman here in the Cloverleaf magazine.

Her quiet work behind the scenes and the very public life she lived were held always within the vow she made to be "*devoted to your service* … *God help me to make good my vow*". To the end the Queen was faithful to that promise, her servanthood was a mark of her faith and ministry as a Christian, all set within the context of her strong belief in God. At the Service in St Giles Cathedral, Nicola Sturgeon read the words from the Book of Ecclesiastes chapter 3 which begins:
